BOTTOM LINE

WHEN IT COMES TO TRAGEDY, BE A FRIEND NOT A FIXER.

SCRIPTURE

Ruth replied, "Don't urge me to leave you or to turn back from you. Where you go I will go, and where you stay I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God" (Ruth 1:16 NIV).

GOAL OF SMALL GROUP

To help students see the importance of simply being there for people who are going through a tragedy, even if they don't know what to say.

THINK ABOUT THIS

Leaders — It's easy to feel pressure to have all the right things to say in a tragedy, but often the most helpful thing you can do is listen. Listen to stories. Listen to feelings. Just listen.

SAY THIS

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. What are some things your parents or stepparents say to you when you're having a bad day or going through a tough time?
- 2. When someone close to you is going through a tragedy, are you more likely to act like everything is normal, talk too much, or avoid them altogether?
- 3. When someone close to you is going through a painful situation, why is it sometimes uncomfortable to be around them?
- 4. Naomi pushed her daughters-in-law away. Why do you think it's so easy to push people away when you face tragedy?
- 5. Why is it sometimes difficult to believe that God can use you to help somebody who's hurting? What are some ways that people truly help other people heal?
- 6. Why is it important to be there for people, even when you don't have the right words to say?
- 7. When it comes to tragedy, what do a friend and a fixer do differently?
